SSC Report: Expansion of State Services Commission Inquiry - Thompson & Clark

Purpose of Report

a This memorandum advises you of the basis for including Crown Research Institutes in the current State Services Commission inquiry regarding agency engagement with Thompson & Clark.

Background

- 1. On 16 March 2018, the State Services Commissioner commenced an inquiry into the circumstances, reasons and outcome of Southern Response Earthquake Services Limited's engagement of external security consultants, including Thompson and Clark Investigations Ltd (TCIL). The inquiry terms of reference were amended soon after to also include the Ministry of Business, Innovation and Employment's relationship with TCIL.
- 2. The conduct of the inquiry identified additional information relating to other Government agencies. The Commissioner was concerned about the nature of engagement between TCIL and State sector agencies, and as a result directed that the terms of reference be widened to cover all State sector agencies. This was considered a necessary assurance that the use of external security resources are being procured, managed and applied in a manner that is consistent with the expectations of the public service, to maintain public trust and confidence in the activities of the State sector.
- Given the nature of the information gained by the inquiry to date, we have identified that TCIL has been engaged by Crown Research Institutes (CRIs) in some capacity. As a result, we recommend that CRIs be included within the scope of the inquiry.
- 4. The Commissioner is only empowered to include these entities at your request as the Minister of Research, Science and Innovation, pursuant to section 11(4) of the State Sector Act 1988.
- 5. Should you request that the Commissioner include CRIs within the scope of the inquiry, we have included a letter for you to sign formalising this request. The State Services Commission will work with the inquiry team to ensure that CRIs are included in the appropriate manner to enable comment on their use of TCIL in the final inquiry report.

Key activities this week:

The Inquiry team continued to progress analysis of information supplied by entities. This included a full re-check of each entity response to ensure all follow up action has been undertaken. There are a number of follow ups required that are of a minor nature and these are being progressed at pace. Outstanding interviews relate to NZ Customs (employee is overseas) and NZTA (scheduling challenges at their end).

The Inquiry team interviewed the Director of InfoLog – the main provider of Motor Vehicle Registry information to the state sector. An additional interview was conducted with Gavin Clark from TCIL relating to MPI.

The Inquiry team conducted its first structured deliberation meeting. The draft key findings were considered and the structure of the full report agreed. Drafting has now commenced as it relates to the Inquiry scope to date.

A letter to CRI's has been prepared to advance the Inquiry into these new entities. This will be circulated by SSC as soon as practicable.

The coming week will focus on preparation of a draft report in parallel with progressing the Inquiry with the new entities. il Carvi

Proposal	To update Cabinet on progress with the inquiry into the use of external security consultants in State services agencies. This update is for Cabinet's information only.			
Background	 The inquiry into use of external security consultants was initiated by the State Services Commissioner on 16 March 2018 to investigate the circumstances, reasons and outcome of Southern Response Earthquake Services Limited's engagement of external security consultants, including Thompson and Clark Investigations Ltd (TCIL). Since it commenced, due to new information coming to light, the inquiry's scope has twice been extended – it now covers all State services agencies. 			
Sic	You will have seen the Police Commissioner's recent statement that NZ Police will be conducting their own internal investigation into their use of external security consultants. Due to the independence of NZ Police in operational (and constabulary) matters, the Commissioner is unable to include Police in the inquiry.			

Inquiry update

Given the nature of information received by the inquiry to date, the inquiry team has identified that TCIL has been engaged by Crown Research Institutes (CRIs) in some capacity. While part of the State services, the State Services Commissioner's powers to investigate do not extend to CRIs without the request of the responsible Minister or Prime Minister.

On 1 October 2018, I wrote to the Commissioner to request that he use his powers under the State Sector Act to include CRIs within the scope of the inquiry. That is now underway.

Information received by the inquiry team also indicates that Tertiary Education Institutions (TEIs) may have used TCIL (and possibly other consultants) in some capacity. Neither the State Services Commission (SSC), or anyone else has the

ability to investigate TEIs in this matter. On advice of SSC and TEC, the Minister of Education will be writing to TEIs strongly suggesting that they assure the Minister, through TEC, that any use of external security consultants has been undertaken in a manner consistent with public expectations of the State sector.

If the inquiry proceeds as expected, it is now likely to conclude by the end of November. The Commissioner will release the report, including a full press conference, and any supporting materials in November.

We recommend that you:

 agree to release this aide-memoire in full once it has been considered by you, and following release of the final inquiry report by the State Services Commission.

Dear Chair

State Services Commission Inquiry Into the Use of External Security Consultants

You may be aware, the State Services Commissioner has appointed me, together with Simon Mount QC, to undertake an Inquiry under the State Sector Act 1988 into the use of external security consultants by Crown agencies.

Pursuant to section 11(4) of the State Sector Act, the Minister of Research, Science and Innovation has now requested that this Inquiry be extended to include Crown Research Institutes (CRIs) as set out in Appendix 1.

The Inquiry is now progressing with urgency and we will require your assistance to satisfy our information requests.

Given the breadth of the terms of reference, as a first step we are inviting Chief Executives of CRI's to satisfy themselves, through self-evaluation, whether there are any matters that should be brought to the attention of the Inquiry.

As a result, I invite you to take appropriate steps in your context to assure yourself that:

- any use of external security consultants in general, and TCIL in particular, by your organisation is appropriate, well managed and there are appropriate controls and oversight in place;
- any interactions or relationships with external security consultants, including TCIL, are consistent
 with the professional expectations of the public service as expressed in the Code of Conduct for
 the State Services.

By "external security consultants", I mean any company or individual contracted to your organisation to provide specialist investigative or security services as further defined below. This includes services related to high-level security assessments and private investigation of individuals or groups. Within this context, it also includes engagement of third parties to gather intelligence from open source documents on security related issues; use of surveillance on individuals, groups or meetings; security or threat assessments of individuals or groups; and analysis of any information or intelligence gathered in the manner described above.

This definition **excludes** investigations related to information technology security (including forensic IT services); and investigations undertaken by auditors related to specific cases of fraud (but it includes private investigators engaged to detect fraud). It also excludes routine engagement of security guard services, alarm monitoring and general media and social monitoring undertaken by third party providers.



The initial period of interest is from 2008 to the present, but you are of course not precluded from looking beyond this period. We ask that you take all reasonable steps to achieve this assurance including accessing all financial records available and a thorough review of contract registries. The steps you take to assure yourself should include, at a minimum:

- Checking to determine whether your agency has or has had any relationship with <u>any</u> external security consultants (including private investigators) delivering the services outlined above. As well as looking in your contract system using key word search terms, we would suggest it would be appropriate to search financial and email systems in case there is a relationship outside of a formal contract. Please ensure your search includes any interaction with TCIL or an associated entity as listed in Appendix 2.
- Checking whether your organisation has used, or is using, platforms such as Wordpress or Slack
 to exchange information with external security consultants. If these platforms have been used, it
 is important to clarify the nature of information that has been provided or supplied and assess
 how that information has been stored and managed.
- Where there is a contract, you may wish to consider whether the services are reviewed regularly, whether the contract has ownership/oversight, whether the work procured matches the work delivered and whether the work delivered seems appropriate. You may also want to ensure that any providers have appropriate qualifications; for example, that they hold relevant licenses or certificates of approval for private security and investigation work under the Private Security Personnel Licensing Authority.
- Where there is not a contract, there may be value in considering whether the interaction seems
 appropriate. For example is the lack of contract explicable, do emails seem professional, is
 information exchanged consistent with what you would expect of state servants. We expect this
 will require a search of your email system.

If your organisation has been affected by restructure or merger, we would expect you takereasonable steps to provide the assurance for those organisations that predated establishment where those records are available.

We expect you should be able to undertake this assurance informed by seven years' worth offinancial records and, on a best endeavors basis, to seek assurance for at least the last ten years.

Please could you report on the outcome of your internal review to Sarah Baddeley at MartinJenkins: 9(2)(a) privacy

In particular please advise whether:

- You identify any interactions with TCIL, its associated entities, or other providers, falling within the definition above; and whether
- In your view any of those interactions may give cause for concern.

If you have engaged security consultants in the general manner outlined in this letter it is likely that the Inquiry will request all relevant information. It is also likely that we will seek to interview employees with an involvement in that engagement. As such, we recommend you prepare the information in an organised manner with a view that it will likely be requested by the Inquiry team.

Key activities this week:

Guidance was prepared for CRIs to undertaken their self-evaluation. We also liaised with the monitoring part of MBIE and were supplied a recent letter that went from their Minister to all Chairs regarding use of external security consultants. Note, only GNS has so far engaged with the Inquiry team (expected to be a nil response). This is a risk to the Inquiry and we intend to follow up with the MBIE monitoring team to get individual contacts within CRIs to touch base with them to ascertain their progress. If we wait until the end of October for their responses there is a material risk to the timeframe.



Proposal	To provide clarification for Cabinet on agencies included within the scope of the inquiry into use of external security consultants, described in the updated terms of reference as "all State services agencies". This update is for Cabinet's information only.
Background	On 7 October, Acting Minister of State Services Hon Dr Megan Woods provided an update to Cabinet on progress with the inquiry, including the recent inclusion of Crown Research Institutes, and alternative measures taken to provide assurance over New Zealand Police and Tertiary Education Institutions. Cabinet requested clarification of agencies now included in the "all State services agencies" scope of the inquiry.
810	Since the Inquiry was initiated by the State Services Commissioner on 16 March 2018, the scope of the inquiry has twice been extended due to new information coming to light. Agencies now include in scope of the inquiry are those that fall within the State Services Commissioner's powers under the State Sector Act to set standards of integrity and conduct. In summary these are:
Agencies within scope	 All core Public Service departments (the Ministries); Crown entities; Crown Entity Companies; Crown Entity Subsidiaries; and Public Finance Act Schedule 4A Companies.
11.	In addition, the Minister for Research, Science and Innovation has written to the Commissioner requesting that Crown Research Institutes be included within scope of the inquiry using the Commissioner's statutory powers of inquiry under

section 11(4) of the State Sector Act.

A comprehensive summary of all agencies is provided for Cabinet's information.

New Zealand Police and Tertiary Education Institutions are not able to be investigated by the Commissioner due to statutory independence (operational and constabulary independence, and academic independence respectively). However, there are processes in place to provide assurance to Ministers that any use of security consultants by these agencies has been undertaken in a manner consistent with public expectations of the State sector.

We recommend that you:

 agree to release this aide-memoire in full once it has been considered by you, and following release of the final inquiry report by the State Services Commission.

Engagement of external security providers

I write regarding the engagement of external security providers.

The State Services Commission (SSC) commenced an inquiry on 16 March 2018 into the circumstances, reasons and outcome of Southern Response Earthquake Services Limited's engagement of external security consultants, including Thompson and Clark Investigations Ltd (TCIL). The inquiry terms of reference were subsequently widened to cover all State sector agencies.

Unlawful or inappropriate intrusions into the activities of the public by providers that are engaged by agencies are serious allegations. Public assurance that external security resources are being used in a manner that is consistent with the expectations of the State services is required, to maintain public trust and confidence in the activities of the State sector.

Tertiary education institutes (TEIs) do not fall within the scope of the State Services Commissioner's powers of inquiry. This reflects the importance of avoiding any interference with academic freedom and autonomy. It is my view, however, that it is in the public interest that TEIs, as part of the wider State sector, are able to provide an assurance to me that the use of external security providers (if any) is both lawful and appropriate.

I have expressed my view in correspondence to all TEIs, and sought their assurance that their use, or that of their subsidiaries, of external security providers (if any) is consistent with public expectations of the State sector. I have also asked the TEIs to respond if they or their subsidiaries have not used any external security consultants. I have asked for their responses be provided to you, within the next month, to be passed on to me.

Your cooperation in providing any assistance requested by the TEIs in this matter and collating and forwarding responses to me would be appreciated. The SSC is in a position to provide you with any guidance you consider necessary.
